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

PROGRAM GROWTH COMPARISON



This fiscal year saw continued growth in all program areas supported by our 24 dynamic and engaged staff totalling over 116 years of combined experience. This past year we supported 1,161 palliative individuals, 442 bereaved individuals, 723 children, 151 groups inclusive of 1787 participants and our volunteers provided 5,347 hours of support. Overall, our staff and volunteers supported 2,893 individuals by providing 10,400 in-person visits, video conferences or telephone support, through our Hospice Counselling, Caregiver Support, Help Us Understand Grief (HUUG), Social Connextions, Health and Wellness, and Bereavement programs.



Message from the Chair and Executive Director

Heart House Hospice has undergone significant changes over Fiscal Year 2021-2022, with the intention to nurture further growth and resilience. Staff, volunteers and students welcomed a new Executive Director, Kitrina Fex, this year with the retirement of our tenured leader, Theresa Greer.

This fiscal year was dominated by Covid-19 again. The evolution of lessons learned from our prior year validated our resilience and commitment to providing compassionate care in our community and beyond. Our programs and services continued to support increased demand, and the community impact was significant. We successfully created access for our clients and families who may not have engaged due to accessibility and public health restrictions. This valuable lesson will continue to be leveraged and considered throughout our programming evolution. This year our programs experienced significant increased referral volumes from our year prior. The tables on the left highlight our significant growth and increased need across our Hospice Counselling, Caregiver Support, HUUG, Health & Wellness and Bereavement programs and services. Despite ongoing systemic human resource capacity pressures, our response rate exceeded 90% within 48 hours of receiving a referral

As we continue to reflect on our resilience and that of our community, Heart House Hospice drives forward with a growth mindset and the determination toward the future build of our 12-bed residential hospice facility, which will be the first to support our Mississauga community. We have made significant and positive strides toward this facility coming to reality. We continue to make every effort to ensure this succeeds.

Message from Bonnie Crombie, Honourary Campaign Chair

My father spent his final days in a hospital. While he received good care, the setting was institutional; he was surrounded by machines, busy staff and the endless hustle and bustle of a large healthcare centre.

At the end of such a beautiful life, he should not have had to spend his final days in that kind of an environment. But my family didn't have any other choice.

It was at that moment - I realized Mississauga urgently needs its own Hospice Centre: a place where community members can receive proper care - at the end of their lives – no matter how long or short – with compassion, dignity and respect. A place where patients and their families can find peace and comfort. A place that feels more like home. A place where palliative physicians, healthcare staff and volunteers are devoted to creating meaningful end-of-life experiences for individuals and families and providing wraparound services to support the dying, death and grief journey every step of the way. As one of the most culturally diverse cities in the world that is home to a growing and aging population, our residents need access to innovative, community-based health services all under one roof.

It's for all of these reasons that I am so proud and grateful to serve as Honourary Campaign Chair for Building Compassion – Heart House Hospice's \$30 million campaign to build Mississauga's first Hospice Centre.

This new centre will be part of a brand-new health campus being developed in the heart of our city in partnership with Trillium Health Partners. It will offer 12 fully equipped hospice residence suites, a beautiful home-like atmosphere and ample space for the delivery and expansion of Heart House Hospice's celebrated communitybased programs. It will transform experiences and conversations around end of life for people of all ages and all cultural backgrounds throughout Mississauga, building strength and resiliency throughout our community.

It is the kind of place I wish my father could have lived out his final days.

That's why I am calling upon everyone in Mississauga, and all those with roots in our city or who simply love our community, to join together in support and celebration of our very first Hospice Centre.

Your generosity will not only help us build the future of end-of-life care in Mississauga, it will change lives. Only by working together, will we ensure that our growing city remains healthy and vibrant for generations to come.

Heart House Hospice: A History and Future Built on Compassion

Since 1985, with the support of our extraordinary community of donors and partners, Heart House Hospice has provided compassionate, person-centred hospice palliative care and end-of-life advocacy to the people of Mississauga and Brampton.

Delivering community-based, in-home services for people of all ages and cultural backgrounds throughout one of Canada's most vibrant and diverse cities, we are committed to transforming experiences and conversations around death, dying and grief – building the strength and resilience of Mississauga, one family at a time.

In 2021, we defined our new vision, mission and strategic pillars to help guide us through our next phase of transformational change and beyond. As we plan for our state-of-theart new hospice residence centre in the heart of Mississauga and Brampton, we are committed to delivering excellence for the future of hospice palliative care in our community.

Spotlight: Helpline

A daughter called to ask for guidance: "I am not sure what to do; my mom has stopped eating." A man was told he had only six months to live. He called to seek guidance on how to talk to his grandchildren "I do not want my grandchildren to see me. I make sure they are not around much. I want to hide from them. I do not know how to talk to them about me dying." A young son, 18 years old, called to inquire how to help his father "My father is having assisted dying next week. He is really struggling with sleep, and I do not know what to do."

Navigating health care can be difficult at the best of times. Add the complexity of a diagnosis of a terminal illness and it can, at times, feel impossible. The Hospice Palliative Helpline exists to help those who are living with a life limiting illness, their families and friends, care providers in the community and health care professionals with information, education, counselling, and navigation of our Hospice Palliative Care system.

Just in this past year, the Hospice Palliative Helpline has fielded over 366 calls from those who were not sure where to turn. A daughter calls. Her mom has been feeling increasingly worse throughout the day. The nurse came to visit, but the daughter was at work. The daughter is feeling anxious, tearful, overwhelmed and is not sure what to do to help support her mom. Experienced and trained hospice staff are there to answer that call to support the daughter with the practical elements of whom to reach out to as well as support psychosocially, in managing the emotions of caring for her dying mother, the anxiety, fear and grief that she is experiencing.

Of all the callers to the Hospice Palliative Helpline, 43% are looking for immediate support. The Helpline team works to go above and beyond responding to 87% of all Helpline calls, urgent or not, in under an hour. The team knows that within the last 3 months of life, most calls and emergency room visits are due to psychosocial issues and are not medical based. Psychosocial concerns were the main reason for someone to reach out to the Hospice Palliative Helpline 53% of the time last year. Being able to support an individual, their family or friends quickly, means anxieties can be reduced, and help provided to navigate situations and help people feel a better sense of management to hopefully prevent unnecessary emergency room visits.

The Hospice Palliative Helpline has become a lifeline to many. As it has continued to expand the impact that it has for all callers, the desire to spread the word about this service only grows. The goal is for the Hospice Palliative Helpline to be one of the most widely used resources in the community. The outcome cannot be changed for someone with a life limiting illness, but it can provide the support, guidance, and connections to make it feel more meaningful.



Indeed, this was the best decision I have made for my journey of self-growth and the incredible compassion and kindness of the hospice world.

My name is Cherry, I'm a volunteer at Heart House Hospice, and I love what I do! My motivation, continuously, is meeting the people we serve, their families and caregivers, the devoted support workers, volunteers, and staff all connected to Heart House Hospice. It takes a village to provide a safe, positive, and kind environment for the hardest and saddest parts of our lives.

I have been extremely fortunate; I have been able to sign up for many different workshops that Heart House Hospice offers to their volunteers. The workshops cover many modalities which have helped to assist my goal of ensuring we can provide compassion, support, and advocacy that lessens the distress of serious illness and loss on individuals, families, and the community.

Whether the people we serve have just received a palliative diagnosis, are supporting a loved one as their primary caregiver, or need bereavement services after losing a loved one, there are many possibilities for programs and services. As volunteers, we take great pride in providing respite relief, therapeutic touch, Reiki, journaling, meditation, gentle aroma touch, art and music therapy, social connection days, and many other programs to support the end-of-life journey. Along with many other volunteers, I have completed training for these services at Heart House Hospice.

I can also provide in-home visits, over-the-phone visits and assist with in-office wellness days that welcome the people we serve to enjoy a one-hour health and wellness treatment.

After initially only doing respite work for the first two years, I now primarily am involved with the complementary therapies mentioned above. The responses from the people we serve and their families are very encouraging and fulfilling. Our programs, taught by our professional wellness, training staff and social workers, continually motivate me and provide me with many resources, educational programs, and webinars. Even during Covid, I and other volunteers were not isolated from clients. We still were very involved. Heart House Hospice created new ways for us to continue to support the people we serve in fantastic and exciting alternative ways, while still staying safe.

As I continue to grow with Heart House Hospice, I have had many beautiful experiences with very courageous individuals facing their end-of-life

journey; young and old, palliative or providing primary care, or those who are bereaved. Each story is different yet intrinsically connected by some common factors: a desire to be treated with dignity, validated, touched and heard, compassion and kindness.

Heart House Hospice is about compassionate hospice care, yet more. Many volunteers contribute to different areas of the hospice than what I already have mentioned. As a volunteer, at Heart House, I have the privilege of spending time, sitting with, and listening to people at various stages of their lives as they struggle with their serious illness. For example, I can be there for a caregiver who needs support while caring for an extremely ill loved one or those in deep grief.

Heart House Hospice is one of the pillars of our "village," as it is a very much-needed service that may, at times, be an uncomfortable reality for people. However, it is a day-to-day reality for all the people we serve and their family members who are comforted by our staff and us as volunteers, even if it is only for a few moments or a few hours of their terribly busy and challenging days.

Building up the pillars of this village is a fundamental and necessary foundation. Even as we continue to work toward building a Hospice Centre with residential suites, in Mississauga,




